MEET MICHAEL ORETADE

An interview with the Green Party candidate for District 1 State Senate

Having petitioned his way onto the November ballot, 29-year-old Hartford native, activist, and educator Michael Oretade is challenging Democratic State Senator John Fonfara – who is 66 and running for his 14th term – in a bid to represent the people of South Hartford and a portion of Wethersfield at the State Capitol. It's a "David vs. Goliath" effort, an uphill battle, but newcomer Oretade is optimistic, and recently spoke with me about his vision and goals for District 1. This interview was originally published in The Hartford News on August 4, 2022.

Hartford News (HN): Michael, how is your campaign for State Senate progressing?

Michael Oretade (MO): I've been engaging with the community, canvassing daily, and my goal is to knock on 20,000 doors. I've done 2,000 already and plan to have 5,000 done by the end of August. I'm already on the ballot, but if I can get 1,500 petition signatures, I will qualify for election grants that



would financially bolster my cam-

HN: Senator Fonfara is running for his 14th term, and prior to that was a member of Connecticut's House of Representatives for 10 years. In light of that, how do you view your chances to unseat the incumbent?

MO: I think we get a sense of how we need new representation. He might be a little out of touch with his base. A lot of career politicians don't need to engage; they're not worried at all. Senator Fonfara mails

Is Donald John Trump a Flight Risk?

day, August 9, Federal Bureau of Investigation agents raided the Mar-a-Lago compound of Donald Trump or as Ivana used to say, "The Donald." And so The Donald was busted. And as former President Trump stated, "They even broke into my safe." But "they" likely didn't find any money unless he had stashed a few suitcases full for a quick getaway to Putin's Moscow, the only country that might take him besides North Korea. (More on Moscow later.)

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From the House: Capitol Update

Connecticut Stands Strong for Women's Rights

In a shocking but somewhat expected 6-3 decision last month, the U.S. Supreme Court overturned the landmark Roe v. Wade case and eliminated the constitutional right to an abortion after nearly 50 years.

Despite this very disturbing decision, it is important for everyone to know that your state legislature had previously ensured a women's right to reproductive healthcare in Connecticut would continue under our state's laws.

The Connecticut General Assembly passed the Reproductive Freedom Defense Act during the 2022 legislative session, which includes legal protections for medical providers and patients traveling to Connecticut seeking abortion care. In addition, this legislation also allows for advanced practitioners for whom abortion care is part of their scope of practice to perform abortions.

Governor Lamont has already signed this bill into law, putting our state at the forefront of protecting reproductive rights. Connecticut also codified Roe V. Wade into our state Constitution in 1990.

A national analysis by the Guttmacher Institute, a national reproductive health research group, counts 26 states as "certain or likely to ban abortion" under all or most circumstances or early in the gestation period, such as abortions after six weeks of pregnancy. Half of those states already have so-called "trigger laws" to ban abortion immediately upon Roe's reversal.

This harmful Supreme Court opinion also casts potential doubt on the future protections of same-sex marriage, other LGBTQ rights and access to contraception. Be assured, I will do everything in my power to make sure this does not happen in our state.

Fighting for the right to choose, protecting practitioners, and keeping Connecticut a safe place for all will always be at the top of my priority list.

State Invests in Hartford

Connecticut is making major new investments in a variety of community projects in Hartford. We've targeted funding to the City of Hartford, the Capital Region Development Authority (CRDA), Connecticut Science Center, as well as a number of local neighborhood non-profits to help with their missions.

Among the City of Hartford grants is funding for:

- Brownfield remediation \$2 million
- The hARTline linear park project connecting Hartford and Bloomfield - \$1.5 million
- Property improvements on Magnolia and Irving streets \$1 million

Included in the CRDA funding is \$5.5 million for redevelopment of the former Fuller Brush factory in north Hartford into new housing units. The Connecticut Science Center is slated to receive \$10 million for renovations and technology upgrades.

This is a much-needed infusion in upgrading our physical infrastructure for the benefit of everyone who lives in and visits Hartford, which in turn will help encourage further investment and economic growth in our City. I'm proud to have been able to help secure this funding and grateful for the work and support of my colleagues in the Hartford legislative delegation throughout the process."

Specific non-profit grants are designated for the:

- Elizabeth Park Conservancy \$1 million
- Northside Neighborhood Alliance \$500,000
- YMCA of Greater Hartford, Albany Ave. location \$500,000
- Boys & Girls Club of Hartford, Northwest location \$500,000

Each grant will help these community-based organizations move their important mission forward which will not only enhance the quality of life in the neighborhoods they are located but benefit all residents throughout the City. These non-profits have a proven track record of improving the lives of the people they serve.

I want to thank Governor Lamont and Secretary Beckham for working closely with me and the Hartford Delegation to advance this funding. The money was approved Friday at a meeting of the State Bond Commission.







Thursday, Sept. 15 Author Talk: Night Boat To New York


Journalist and Connecticut River Historian Erik Hesselberg joins Connecticut River Museum Curator Amy Trout for an illuminating conversation on a topic that Mark Twain would have surely

enjoyed: steamboats! Night Boat to New York: Steamboats on the Connecticut, 1824-1931, is a portrait of the vanished steamboat dayswhen a procession of stately sidewheelers plied between Hartford and New York City, docking at Peck's Slip on the East River in the shadow of the Brooklyn Bridge. At one time, Hartford could boast two thousand steamboat arrivals and departures in a year. Altogether, some thirty-five large steamboats were in service on the Connecticut River in these years, largely on the Hartford to New York City route. These Long Island Sound steamers, unlike the tubby, wedding cake dowagers of Western waters, were long, sleek craft, with sharp prows cutting a neat wake as they cruised along. Departing each afternoon from State Street or Talcott Street wharf in Hartford, the "night

boats" reached New York at daybreak, inaugurating a pattern of city commuting that continues to this day. Each registrant will receive \$5 off the purchase of *Night Boat to New York*:. In person event; \$5 admission. Go to marktwainhouse.org to register.




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Adam Cloud: Proud to Say No

Retiring City Treasurer - and Westend resident - Adam Cloud can look back on his 11 years of service in elected office with pride. Protecting pensioners, City parks and trust funds, managing the City's cash and overseeing all of the City employees' retirement plans. Additionally, Cloud worked tirelessly to improve Hartford's bond rating and was responsible for structuring the bond offering that built the Yard Goats stadium. However, it seems he is most proud of his steadfast commitment to serve as a resource and at times a voice of opposition to policies that were not in the best interest of the City. Cloud strove to keep the independence of his office and the trust of those who elected him and sometimes that meant saying no.

It seems that many ideas and concepts that may look promising on the surface lose their underpinnings upon close examination, especially in terms of the City of

Cloud has a long history of service to the City of Hartford dating back to the 1990's when he served as the Chairman of the City's Redevelopment Agency, a Commissioner of the MDC, acted as the Financial Advisor to the City on all debt issuances, the Treasurer of the Democratic Town Committee and as the Assistant City Treasurer before being elected on his own right in 2011. Cloud won three consecutive 4- year terms as Treasurer and was the longest serving elected official among all that currently serve the City. Throughout his time as Treasurer, Cloud helped and mentored many members of the Council and is very proud of the strong relationship that was built between he and Mayor Bronin. Hopefully, as a private citizen, he will stay as a player in city politics and policy.

Cloud has endorsed the city's longtime Assistant Treasurer Carmen Sierra, who has worked

Hartford's fiscal stability. For example, preventing bankruptcy was a top priority for Cloud. By working with the State legislature (especially Speaker of the House Matt Ritter), he was instrumental in the creation of the contract assistance agreement that helped stave off bankruptcy by having the State pay the outstanding debt service on the City's general obligation bonds which freed up approximately \$50m a year in expense for the City.

Cloud was a strong advocate for an increase in PILOT (Payment In Lieu Of Taxes) payments to the City. These payments are made to municipalities to make up for tax revenue lost by the city because so much of its land is occupied by state offices, hospitals, non-profit agencies, churches, etc. and therefore tax exempt. He argued strongly and effectively that the state never lived up to its PILOT obligations, causing Hartford to raise property taxes to the point of counter-productivity. For an example, housing backed by the Capital Region Development Authority (CRDA) is taxed as residential (1-3 units) rather than commercial (4 or more units). Otherwise, no investor would even look at Hartford with its 70+ mill rate (with the current reval, the rate dips a bit below 70, but is still well above that of competing cities

and towns).

closely with him on every aspect of the office's initiatives including legislative policies, pension management and management of the day-to-day office operations and staff, to serve out his term through the next election.

The Treasurer's office - the third leg of the stool, with the other two being the mayor's office and city council - is critical in the hard-fought battles over dubious policies that affect our bond rating and pension obligations. Cloud is confident Sierra will continue to efficiently manage the office of the City Treasurer, serve as a dedicated steward of the city's \$1 billion pension plan, as well as understands the politics of this City. Sierra is a well-known personable civil servant who has decades of experience in public service including the last decade as the city's number two person in the Treasurer's office. Sierra has a Masters Degree in Management from the University of Hartford and was selected by Harvard for a Certification program in Public

So, Adam Cloud, good luck in whatever ventures await you, and let's hope you're not missed too much! And, as we look forward to next year's municipal elections, the voices of veteran politicians like Cloud will have a major effect. It will be interesting to see what he will have to say.

Baby it's hot outside, so what can we do inside, where it is cool? The museums in Connecticut are free this summer, and you might wonder what they have to offer. The Wadsworth Atheneum at 600 Main Street is free to Hartford residents year-round through their Wadsworth Welcome program. They offer a lot of

great programming, and currently there are three exhibits that you will want to see: "Anika Noni Rose", "Hamilton the Art of Remaking History", and "Creative Connecticut". What surprised me was the amazing costume and textile infusion into all of the exhibits.

The Amistad Center for Art & Culture is exhibiting Anika Noni Rose until September 18, 2022. Anika Noni Rose is an actor, dancer, singer and a graduate of Bloomfield High School. This exhibition will display memorabilia from Rose's personal collection of her career from childhood to the present day. She was the voice for Tiana in the Disney film The Princess and the Frog, the first African-American movie lead for Disney. There is a drop dead gorgeous blue and silver sequins

dress. She has appeared in other movies, several Broadway productions, and is the winner of a Tony Award, and a host of TV series.

Want to infuse your children or your own knowledge base with a little history? The Wadsworth has the perfect exhibit, "Hamilton, the Art of Remaking History, which runs June 24 – September 11. The award-winning musical "Hamilton" was on stage at The Bushnell this summer, and when you visit the Wadsworth you'll see how historic imagery influenced the show's costume and set designs. The exhibit features items that relate to the era reimagined in "Hamilton", including paintings by John Trumbull and Gilbert

Stuart, silver pieces, and rarely seen archival letters to Colonel Jeremiah Wadsworth. The quilt on display is a gem, and the quality and condition of the dresses and menswear will astound you. It provides 'fresh look at the past through the lens of the present'. It's definitely a different perspective than what we've seen from the

Revolutionary period in the past.

Don't walk past the rotating installation in Creative Connecticut, which is in the lobby. Creative Connecticut is where various contemporary makers and their creations are being featured. Hartford-born designer Travis Terry founded IEMBE, a dynamic new brand creating clothing and accessories. The name IEMBE plays on the phrase "in my bag," that is, to be completely absorbed in an activity or a mental zone to the point of being unbeatable. Created from vegan leather, a sustainable, cruelty-free polymer, and in a range of bold colors, Terry calls it a versatile "4-in-1 bag...a purse, a bookbag, a shoulder bag, or just a clutch." Terry, an example of Connecticut creativity, still lives and works in Hartford and believes that

Will your group include children? Don't miss Second Saturdays for Families. This month's programming is Sight and Sound on August 13th, noon— 2:00 p.m. Explore how Naama Tsabar creates objects that function both as artworks and musical instruments. Design a musical instrument of your own and watch a presentation by our friends at the Connecticut Science Center as they unravel the mysteries behind sound. Find the Ice Cream for a Dream truck for free ice cream while supplies last. The Wadsworth Atheneum is open Thursday-Sunday from noon—5:00 p.m.

out his campaign postcards and only appears at community conversations during election season. Long-term incumbent's concerns are mostly about maintaining and increasing campaign donations.

HN: You've been canvassing in Wethersfield, a majority white area. How has your reception been? Will getting votes there be a big hurdle?

MO: A lot of people there said it was time for new blood, and change. A few said "I'm a fan of Fonfara", but I get it—a lot are staunch Democrats.

HN: Looking ahead, if you win in November, what committee assignment as a State Senator would you most want where you feel you could provide significant input?

MO: The Environmental Committee. That's where I'd want to start, having already been building a relationship with the State Department of Energy and Environmental Protection (DEEP). After that, the Housing Committee.

HN: Can you elaborate on that?

MO: I strongly believe in transitional housing for the homeless and formerly incarcerated. We need more realistic solutions to that issue in Connecticut. As a people, we need to be more cognizant and help them. No matter what political party, we can agree that stable hous-

ing brings autonomy that is important for all individuals.

HN: How do you feel the State's social equity licensing initiative for the sale and cultivation of legal cannabis is going?

MO: They're botching it. There's so much corporate BS, with those entities—some from out of state—getting first dibs. For them, there's no lottery and no caps—none of that business. It's almost like a full-ride scholarship. If it were up to me there would be no lotteries. Anyone who was previously adversely affected by cannabis prohibition should have had those first dibs. It isn't equitable. When we get people with big corporate ties in elected office, there won't be systems in place to help the little guys.

HN: Senator Fonfara has been adamantly in favor of closing Brainard Airport, and supportive of Hartford's plan to redevelop that South Meadows acreage with upscale housing, retail and a marina. If elected, Brainard and the land it's on would be in your district. What are your thoughts on that plan?

MO: There are already more than 350 jobs supported by the businesses at Brainard Airport. Closing Brainard and eliminating those jobs for area residents is not like eliminating jobs at huge employers like the coal and big oil industries. As for retail, everything is moving toward E-commerce now. And those who have complained about noise from

the aircraft won't have to worry about that much longer, as aviation is on the cusp of shifting from fuel to quiet and non-polluting electric systems. Brainard should stay open.

Colt Dome serves as inspiration for a new RAW exhibit

There is a wonderful Coltsvilleinspired art exhibit at Real Art Ways. It opened on Thursday, July 21st and will run until October 16th. The artist, Heather Heckel, has received 16 art residencies through the National Park Service and the Bureau of Land Management. She is also a Real Art Award recipient. The Coltsville exhibit, "Duality in Unplain Sight", is a series of historical structures and arms. The exhibit brochure states that "Sam Colt sold weapons to both sides of conflicts, and I (the artist) wanted to emphasize this duality--among others-through double imagery, symmetry, and balance: Win/Loss, Life/Death, Friend/Enemy, Exploitation/Profit." Heckel has her own web page where you can see digital versions of the artwork: https://www.heatherheckel.com/res idencies.html. On the website, the artist commented that Samuel Colt "...often used European styles of architecture to provide his immigrant workers with a sense of familiarity."

When I first approached the artwork, I noticed the clean colors, the simple shapes. When I examined them more closely, intricate designs emerged. The artist's medium is colored pencil, which she uses as "dry paint which allows accuracy through blending". Of course, several of the images are very familiar to those of us who live in the Coltsville area, including the Colt Dome, Sam Colt Memorial, Potsdam Cottages, and Armsmear. In addition, lesserknown architecture, the Gardener's Cottage and the Carriage House, are used as subjects. You might want to wander over to Colt Park to check them out. They are located along the Stonington Street walkway across from Groton Street.

Real Art Ways is open Wednesday through Sunday from 3 p.m.-9 p.m. at 56 Arbor Street in Hartford.
